Chairman's Message

A quite erratic pattern of weather over the winter has presented us with an ever-changing set of challenges to keep the Carrs at its best. The multi-use path celebrates its first birthday at the end of February and has already proved its worth through the wet weather, enabling walkers, cyclists, pram pushers and even horse riders to travel the length of the park with ease. Water has built up at various points, possibly due to the changes in drainage caused by the construction of the path, and slight flooding became a major problem for a short time when the water froze. We are in contact with the contractors and hope to resolve the problem soon.

On a festive note, the Carrs was the scene of a pre-Christmas "Santa Dash" which everyone enjoyed, although some of the younger onlookers were left a little confused by the large number of Santas of all ages and sizes racing up and down, and we were pleased to participate in St Bartholomew's Christmas Tree festival with our own tree decorated appropriately with birds, fishes and dogs, and plenty of greenery.

We have had two disappointing occurrences recently: a large amount of graffiti on the bridge and the old toilet block at Twinnies Bridge, and vandalism which destroyed all but five of our young fruit trees in our mini-orchard. Happily, Cheshire East Council sent in a specialist who removed the graffiti quickly and extremely effectively, and we are immensely grateful to Transition Wilmslow's Food Group for their wonderfully swift response in sourcing, funding and, with the help of Incredible Edible, planting replacement fruit trees.

The Carrs has attracted educational activities on a variety of occasions in the past, and we are delighted to welcome a group of final year students

from Manchester University who will be working on the preparation of a management plan for the Carrs through the early spring. They will formally present the plan at the end of April, and we look forward to picking up some good ideas on how we can manage the park more effectively and enhance and increase the wonderful qualities of the area.

We do not receive any regular income and we are always on the look-out for sources of funding for our activities, so our thanks go to Mr Phil Gaskell and to the William Dean Trust for their generous donations which have enabled us to make further inroads into the invasive Himalayan balsam and Japanese Knotweed and to continue our repairs to the erosion of the river banks. Our thanks also to the Woodland Trust for their award of a tree pack which will help us with our programme of tree planting in areas which need screening and which will create wild-life corridors in the park. In February we were delighted to have been selected as one of Waitrose Wilmslow's charitable causes. Thank you to all our readers who picked up the tokens and popped them into our box!
